PLAN AMONGST THE THISTLES

When I think about planning, my mind goes blank and my stomach gurgles a little bit because of all the plans I have made that never came to be. I know that nowadays, for me, that planning seems like wishful thinking and it lacks all measure of certainty and clarity. Why do we feel this way? I believe it's because of the thistles. Planning is personal, but don't become attached. Learn to submit your plan to the Lord.
Thistles hurt, so suffer well.

With God's help, we can plan carefully and prayerfully in the year to come.

*Restricted - means our friends work in an area where they are monitored closely and there may be laws against sharing the Gospel openly. To protect them, and those they serve, we limit the amount of information provided (first name only or in some cases just a letter). As you read their articles, you will see we may replace certain words. These are used in place of others that may draw undue attention to them. (God = Father, He) It's a code and it can be fun communicating with them, so don't be intimidated when connecting with them.

I (Karen) first went to our country of service in Asia when I was 17 years old. I instantly fell in love with the culture and the people. I was quickly burdened by their lack of access to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I prepared to live there full-time, and after David and I were married for three years we moved there. We served those amazing people for 14 years. We have very special friendships with the local brothers and sisters, seeing others come to have a life-giving relationship with Jesus Christ. (Our kids were raised there, and we were content with our life there despite the many challenges of living in a country that is antagonistic to Christians: spiritually, relationally, and numerically in 2020 than in any year prior.) And I believe it is because we have spent more time in seeking God and in pursuing unity as a church. God has poured out His Spirit in fresh ways as we have waited for Him. And He has reminded us of the importance of seeking Him and fellowship with each other.

When Covid unexpectedly and abruptly kept us out of our country of service in the spring of 2020, we had no idea that would be the start of a major transition. These past two years, we have been waiting for the door to open for us to return. The 18 months we spent here in Pinellas County has been a wonderful time of emotional rest, reconnecting with our family and friends, and being able to do what we always do: build up the body and reach out to the lost, those who the Lord places in our lives.

In September, we were still hoping to be able to return to our country of service in March 2022. That's when we were told that our housing in Florida would no longer be available. We prayed and asked the Lord to guide us into what decision we should make: rent or buy? We, of course, received advice from multiple sources. Fervently, I asked God to show us if we were to continue to wait for the doors to open or should we settle here for now. The Lord brought many wise, trusted men into David's path to encourage him that the Lord is changing our path for now. It was hard to really make that decision, but the Father who always provides good gifts began to open doors for us to minister here.

His Work Will Not Be Stopped

Isaiah 55:11 exhorts Israel and it also exhorts and encourages me.so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it.

His Word will accomplish what He desires and what it was sent forth to do. It will not fail - in fact, it is impossible for it to fail. Period. Sometimes, I am privileged to be able to participate and partner with Him in seeing a small aspect of that come to pass in the world. As one of His children, when I seek His heart He reveals it to me, which allows me to see what He is doing and where He is moving in some small part. It is an invitation to join in. For me, I become aware of an empowering grace that draws me deeper and closer and enables me to do so.

Other times I must just believe that His plans and purposes will prevail. I tenaciously cling to the promise that all things will work together for good for them that love Him. I have no understanding, no wisdom or insight, just faith to say yes and take the next step. Sometimes it does not look like what I assumed or imagined it would look like. What ultimately matters to me, is that His plans prevail. **not** that I understand. Sometimes I am not aware that I am working out those details in the day to day... not only do I not get to see the big picture, but that our desire to be led and having a heart postured to hear and obey is enough. Most of the time, all I get is the next step and sometimes that is not even clear. In those instances, I am learning to say yes and do the next right thing, whatever it is.

In a nutshell, this is what the past two years have looked like for me. I was asked to take responsibility in a role that I am not really qualified or gifted to do. I said "Yes", knowing that God was asking and that His grace would be sufficient. I did not know how my visa situation would work out but my "Yes" was all He needed. God provided abundantly in these two issues. He opened a way for three separate visa renewal circumstances in the face of crisis that found the immigration offices closed more than they were open. He has also given me strength to help and serve and lead my team more than I could have asked or imagined.


The teams that I supervise are in the same boat that I am in. Everything is uncertain. They have struggled with visa renewals and God has opened impossible doors. Travel was extremely difficult

or impossible due to regular lockdowns. However, we clung to His promises and pressed on. We had to come up with new ways to do things, new ways to meet remote teams, new ways to translate and check and consult and review. At this moment we have one project that is heading to New Testament typesetting in two different dialects and another that is in the home stretch and could be ready for typesetting as early as the end of 2022. In the midst of all of this, we have two new teams waiting for the green light to arrive.

I am a slow learner sometimes, but am beginning to believe that God is more interested in the journey than the destination!

"Lord willing." A phrase I've said more in the last two years than ever. Not as words casually being spoken, but words considered and meant with a level of understanding I have never had.

When we first began this journey to Kenya, ten years ago, we had a plan: four to five years. Teach the people to study God's Word... and then go home.

In our third year here... God began revealing and orchestrating HIS plan for a U-Turn for Christ Ranch. A place where those struggling with addiction could find freedom in Jesus.

He provided the land. He provided the materials. He provided the workers to build the structures and then provided the first intakes. That final day of construction, seven or eight of the men finished the work and then entered the Ranch that night.

When Covid rolled across the globe, because of our remote location, U-Turn Kisii didn't skip a beat. In fact, we average 15 men on a regular basis. Right now we have 18. And with our focus channeled by something we DID NOT plan for...



we have seen the gracious loving hand of Jesus pulling men from the grip of Satan over and over again.

Two weeks ago, we had a young man enter the program. About 25, drugs, alcohol, and suicide attempts. So many lies of the enemy had become his truth. He had been on a five-day binge when he got here. On his third day, he began detoxing. Physical pain, hallucinations, voices mocking the prayers of his fellow housemates. Lie after lie after lie. He was brought to Randy and me and my mama heart

kicked in.... Oh Jarod.... Those are not the Words of Jesus!!! Jesus came to set you free. Jesus came to give you life. Abundant life! Truth after absolute Truth. We prayed for him. We prayed with him, and

we called on others to pray. We showed him the Armor of God and we showed him how to use it... and he stood!

Today I watched him walk into church with his Bible in hand. A smile and a clarity that exclaimed the delivering, healing, loving touch of a God Whose purpose prevails! And I find myself praising God for directing my steps to allow me to see Him at work!!!

"Dying to Self" is Non-Negotiable

"Dying to Self" has everything to do with self-denial. To deny oneself can only take place through total surrender. God wants all of you your whole heart, mind, body, and soul. He equips us with everything we need to live an abundant and victorious life, but it starts with dving to self and welcoming Christ to live in us instead, even when it's hard.

Proverbs 19:21 tells us that "Many are the plans in a person's heart. but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails". This was certainly true of our lives in 2021 as the plans we had made for ourselves were radically changed from what we thought they would be.

During Sheila's break from teaching at Ukarumpa International School in June and July, we had planned to spend time ministering with those in the surrounding villages and traveling to the PNG island of New Britain with our friends who are Bible translators for the Meramera language; we are their support team. We were excited about working with Bible translation and meeting the Meramera people for the first time and making relationships with them.


However, God had other plans: we spent June and July apart from each other in different countries. This was after learning that a mass on Sheila's arm was an aggressive squamous cell carcinoma. Sheila needed Mohs surgery as soon as possible, and with the lockdown of Australia's borders because of Covid, Sheila had to travel to the U.S. to have the surgery done. Through many details that could only have been arranged by God, she made it to Florida, but because of factors beyond our control, Ken was not able to go with Sheila.

As Ken remained in PNG, he continued his work in the management of keeping the infrastructure in good shape and making sure the needs of the translators were met. Part of his job entails working with many Papua New Guineans, which gives him an excellent opportunity to share the Gospel and minister to them. During this time. Ken also became much more involved with the "Tok Pisin Lotu" in Ukarumpa, which is the worship service with Papua New Guineans in their PNG trade language.

After Sheila returned to PNG following a successful surgery, it was only three months before she had to travel, vet again, back to the U.S. without Ken by her side, due to the death of her mother. We were discouraged to be separated once more, but kept trusting God, knowing that His plans are for our good, even when we do not understand them. During this time as well, Ken continued in the Kingdom work that God called him to do. while also strengthening relationships with other men in the community.

Throughout the past four years in PNG, we have lived through several trials and hardships that we could not have endured unless we had already chosen to "die" to our own plans and obediently surrender to His. Dying to self and understanding the nonnegotiable cost of following Jesus is a necessity in our life as missionaries.

Flexible Living | "His" Established Plan

As a family we are hoping to learn the Agob language while living amongst the people in the Western Province of Papua New Guinea. This is really the only way to learn Agob as there is no text book or Rosetta Stone out for the Agob language. Unfortunately, the living conditions in Agob villages are not ideal for young children like our Shiloh who is one year old. Our setting in the villages consists of no running water, plumbing, electricity, phone or internet service. Our daily challenges involve assuring the cleanliness of our water and the water that others give us when they cook for us, while trying to be adaptable and learn the language and avoid dying from frequent dysentery. These struggles offer many challenges to us staying focused on our goals.

After Ethan's solo trip out to the village to prepare for the family trip, we all readied ourselves and went out to Agob land. We were promised a used house where we would stay as a family. One Agob family had offered their house until the village could build us our own bush house. However, when we arrived to the village, things were not as planned. We were put into the promised house but some of the family decided they would live alongside us in this three room bush house. One room was designated as the storage room for both them and our family, another room was designated the sleep room for our family of three, and the front room was where their family of three would sleep. Our insides screamed, yet our demeaner remained calm as we tried to process what the weeks would be like in this tough situation.

To get to the outside toilet at night, we had to walk next to the floor mattresses of our sleeping host family each time. When Shiloh had diarrhea (which was for most of the trip), the thin walls gave us no privacy in holding the sounds of her bowels. Everything we did was on continuous and constant observation. We controlled only a portion of our meals and water. We all got dysentery and unfortunately, our little girl had it the worst.

Despite the challenges of daily living, the intimate living situation with our host family accelerated relationship building in a way we could not have manufactured on our own, nor could we have done it living separate from them. We were forced to cook together, to cook for each other, and to help each other. Camille sat close to the women and watched them make mats as they taught her. Ethan helped carry materials for a school building project

while working with our village papa. Shiloh grew close to the young girl who lived with us who she was to call "dada," which means older sister in Agob. We all got to meet the extended family of our host family, who we visited regularly, and realized that they viewed themselves as our family as well.

Our challenging living situation was not our plan. Rather, it was what God established instead for His great purpose and for His ultimate glory. Our love for the Agob people grew exponentially through the struggles of our stay as we saw how giving and caring they were with the very little that they had. We would not have dared prescribe a situation like this for anyone, but we are grateful that God saw it fit for us to experience this and honor Him in the process. We pray that the Lord will continue to teach us to hold "our" plans loosely and to gracefully embrace His instead.

Our church always shows up when we support a project – whether it's Christmas for nursing homes and students, supplementing food banks, or reaching out to those around the world. For our 2022 Missions Project, we are partnering with our missionaries Jim & Janice Larson in Tanzania.

Through their program of Intensive Care Ministries, we have identified a need to provide monetary support for two specific biblical education certificate programs.

The first is to provide two classes for 20 women each for the One Year Certificate Program in Bible Teaching. The cost for fully supporting these women for the one year is \$7000.

We chose this program because many of the women in Tanzania have been deceived and do not know the Bible well. Once taught, they can teach others to share the glorious truth of God and the Bible, and minimize the lies that are often taught by false teachers. In 2020, women accounted for approximately 51% of the population. It is important for this half of the population to know that God loves them and died for them.

The next part of our 2022 Missions Project will be to financially support two Certificate in Church Planting programs for 20 students to receive the One-Year Certificate. The cost of this commitment is \$5000. These students will be trained in building new churches that focus on the biblical truths found in the Bible and will teach others how to read the Bible.

Both of these programs fall under our mission statement of planting churches and developing disciples to further God's Kingdom. Our commitment of \$12,000 will multiply and change numerous lives in Tanzania and beyond. To give towards this project, donate to Missions and mark your contribution "2022 Missions Project."





Covid brought many challenges to local churches and forced them to deal with many difficult concerns. But the Lord used the virus to help us arrive at the answer to the vexing missionary question: When do we begin to turn over the work we birthed to our Tanzanian teammates?

Covid arrived in Tanzania in March 2020, our 9th year of ministry. We were three years into our Bible college format offering two programs: a 30-month "Diploma in Pastoral Ministry" for senior pastors, and a 1-year "Certificate in Church Planting" for prospective church planters. The focus for each is training and equipping students to study the Bible systematically and preach its truths biblically.

With Covid's arrival we had to shut down classes indefinitely. Further, challenges with our local immigration office forced us to depart Tanzania immediately. We barely had time to issue instructions to our team, pray with them, then catch a flight that night. Traumatic times for our people; discouraging times for us!

By July, we received government approval to resume classes. But, it would be without us. The immigration office refused to allow our return. Maybe, just maybe, God had this in hand.

Our team jumped at the opportunity to restart classes. Soon they had all four campuses operating with revised class schedules and



students in attendance. It was special to behold, especially the innovative approaches they implemented to make things run better. We were freed to focus on our long-term vision of expanding the work in Tanzania, while planning to bring the vision to other African countries.

Since returning to Tanzania in October 2020, we have seen incredible changes to the ministry work. We doubled the number of instructors to 30... 26 men and four women, all skilled expositional preachers. We added a "Certificate in Bible Teaching" for women to meet the unique needs of female Bible teachers. We opened our fifth campus with plans to open a sixth in 2022. Finally, we were freed to begin planning for offering a 4-year degree soon.

We thank the Lord for liberating us from day-to-day operational concerns that are now handled by a 10-person Tanzanian leadership team. They plan things, run them, and handle all personnel issues—including disciplinary cases. It's exciting to see your "spiritual children" succeeding on their own. God has been good to provide such able and willing teammates!

Three years ago the Lord led Joshua to put a greater emphasis on his work at the Christian School where he works as a teacher and counselor. The leadership transition seemed to vanish into an unforeseeable future. Who was going to be the one or would we have to look for someone from outside our church?

After a difficult time of waiting, we saw how the Lord touched the heart of another one of our leaders. With a wonderful teaching gift, a heart for life group ministry, and even some administrative skills, Robin has grown into an effective assistant to Ron

over the last two years. This fall he has cut back on his hours as a teacher to come on board at the church half time. We are praying that the Lord would confirm to him and his wife the call to one day take over completely. We trust it's all in God's plan and in His timing.

The Father never said it would be easy. As I was concluding an already extended time in the field that had left me exhausted, my anticipated return to the States for much needed rest was suddenly interrupted by the emergence of a virus that was shattering lives throughout the world.

In staying, I was faced with the reality that I live in a place with little access to healthcare. I discovered that even resupplying my medical prescriptions was nearly impossible in a nation that had closed its borders to all entering or leaving the country and had ceased all mail and parcel deliveries. Strictly enforced quarantines resulted in being literally locked within my home only to be allowed a once a week outing to secure necessary food supplies. People around me lost all means of financial support, villagers were sick and dying, and the streets of my city resembled a ghost town. I was losing contact with those that the Father called me to reach with the Good News. For a long time I was totally isolated. I also battled anxiety and panic attacks for the first time in my life.

Yet the Father was there for me. After a time, He enabled a chartered flight back to the States and He provided last minute land transport of medicines from a neighboring country without me even knowing how it was able to cross the border. He opened opportunities for me to come



alongside my national brothers and sisters in new ways through lessening of restrictions and by using technology. I was able to return to the States at last. But being back has not been easy and has not been as free of pressure as I would like. Many medical exams that were delayed abroad were scheduled (leading to the identification of new issues), numerous family events and struggles occurred, visits to supporters, personal counseling debriefs, late night and early morning counseling support telephone calls to several Asia team members remaining in the field, have all limited the quiet time with the Father that I

had hoped for.

Now I am about to return. I am still tired and anxious at times. But I am reminded of how Nehemiah responded when faced with the



task of rebuilding the wall under severe opposition. He could have prayed, "God, get me out of this situation." Instead he prayed, "Strengthen my hands." (Nehemiah 6:9) He was determined to remain steadfast in his responsibility. I ask you to join me in praying for God to strengthen my hands as well to enable me to complete the task to which I was called.

Over the next few months everyone in the church came down with Covid one by one, and we all took care of each other and arranged meal and medicine deliveries, and those with medical experience ministered to the sick. Thankfully all recovered, and the church was unified in a way that only God could have done through such a difficult season.

While anxiety and fear fills the hearts of men, let the peace of Christ rule in our hearts. This season is a unique window of opportunity for us as a church to unify and show the world that GOD is our refuge and strength.

One request involved training on how to share your faith. That class was developed and held for three weeks in August and very well attended. We will repeat this class in 2022 – watch for the announcements and join us. An additional request was to hear more from the pulpit about our supported missionaries and what is happening with the work they are doing. Starting this January with our 2022 Missions Project, we hope to provide more information about specific missionaries and what God is doing in their part of the world. Stay tuned!

"HEART" stands for Hunger Education And Resource Training. This is a school for cross-cultural workers and missionaries and the campus is designed as a functioning simulation of a developing world village and demonstration farm. Students, visitors, and volunteers come here from around the world to gain practical experience and valuable knowledge. We strive to teach a holistic perspective on ministry focused on cultivating genuine relationships, working to improve the quality of life, and sharing the good news of Jesus Christ's unique worldview.

HEART's mission of educating, equipping, and empowering Christian workers with practical skills is what started our partnership with them many years ago. We've sent missionaries there to learn new skills, as well as short-term teams that go to build team unity and work on problem solving. There are many stories of things that were learned at HEART being practical, life-saving experiences used on the mission field.

Students attend HEART to do 15-week college-level training programs, or individuals can do a 3-week training program. For a small donation, teachers can schedule field trips to learn and explore on an interactive tour. Volunteers are greatly appreciated at HEART. Because CCSP values what happens here, we also send work teams as often as we can to help keep the village in operational order. There is always work to do.

Once you've experienced HEART for a weekend, or even a longer period of time, you won't forget it! Relationships are built, skills are learned, and memories are made.

Call To Action What can I do?

Sometimes God speaks to us to do something, but we see that the need is great and it's overwhelming to know where to start. If you are feeling that you'd like to somehow participate in Missions, here are some practical ways to begin.
